ONE WAY TO ORGANIZE A JUNIOR STAMP CLUB

Many factors contribute to the success of a Junior Stamp Club, but two of the most important in my experience of over six years with both Benjamin Franklin Stamp Clubs and those outside the school are INTEREST of the children and a GOOD MEETING PLACE. I have found that children who are at a place because of another reason will attend estamp meetings, but their participation is not nearly so enthusiastic as those who came specifically to attend a stamp meeting. For example, just this fall I held stamp meetings at our church for children whose parents were attending a Bible study at the same time. There was no comparison of the response of these children to that of the children who give up their recess period at school to attend a Benjamin Franklin Stamp Club. The former group did not participate individually as the latter always do, and I had trouble holding their interest for the length of the meeting. Needless to say, I found that I prfer to work with the latter group!!

 I have found that holding my meetings at the school or the public library also contributes to the success of the meeting. Publicity of the meeting needs to be done about two weeks ahead of time -- this allows time for everyone to get the word but prevents forgetting by the children. Posters are best and registration for the first meeting is a must and should be stressed so that ample material will be on hand. One sure way to have a crowd is to give away packets of stamps. And just a word about this - - I have found that 20-25 stamps hinged on a paper inside a glassine envelope with loose hinges for the children to use are the nicest and most preferred by the children, I'll admit that it is easier just to drop the stamps inside the envelope, but they are also easier lost, dropped and ignored. A child will look at the stamps hinged on a paper and study them and

compare them with other children's stamps. and this starts them really looking at stamps. I try to tell them that five stamps that they know and have catalogued makes them more of a collector than 25 stamps loose in an envelope. And I truly believe this. I have had much better response from the children by doing this. Another reason that I have found the school to be a good place is that in our community there are many children living in outlying places that are bussed to school. These children have no way to attend things at the library, but if meetings can be held within the school day, they can attend. Of course, this also means that afterschool, activities, as, far, as stamp collecting clubs, are concerned, are also out, because they are bussed home then.

In using the school or the public library. I try to have at least one assistant, and so far have found that both places are willing to help stamp collecting programs. In the public school system my assistance goes clear to the school superintendent, and I have carte blanche use of the school Xerox to prepare any handouts. I prepare pages for the children to hinge their stamps on. At this time I do not wish to get sidetracked into types of stamp albums except to say that I recommend three ring binders, and we use lined three ring binder paper except when I Xerox the pages that I prepare. We started this school year using the Great American and Transportation series in our programs because they are readily available in good quantities.

Another point I would like to make is that I start with a "Workshop" instead of a "club" - in our location, at least, the word "club" turns everyone off, and the prospect of paying dues will keep children away. Only after I have a working nucleus of 6 - 8 children would I even consider a club. Let's face it, many adults are turned off by the idea

of a club. I have had more than one person tell me he or she was interested in stamp collecting but not participating in a club. I'll have to admit that when I have only 45 minutes at school for my meeting, I would resent very much spending time on "new business", "old business" and all the other parliamentarian rules. I will probably hear some static on this, but keep in mind that I have the most beginning of beginners, and I have only two years at the most and sometimes only one year to give them a sound basis for stamp collecting for the rest of their lives, so I am very jealous of the time we spend together. And they are like dry sponges - there is nothing that I can say to tell you of their interest and enthusiasmi except that I don't find it anywhere else just with the children!

Another point I would like to mention is materials required -- we furnish the children many things, but we make them buy or earn many things. They never cease to be amazed that stamp collectors will send them stamps. and I think it is necessary that they also learn at the same time that they have to obtain stamps on their own. We talk about asking relatives and neighbors for stamps on paper. I have several local businesses that give me their envelopes. And at least once during the school year we have a session of cutting stamps off envelopes - this teaches them that there are things in stamp collecting that are dull work!! And we have soaking sessions at least once. I discovered the hard way not to give each one a little pan with water and turn them loose. We were about 30 minutes latethat day, and I wound up cleaning up the mess!!! It is better to have one pan and have each child go thru the process of soaking the stamp and then putting it on dry paper and soon. One of the things we stress is how many things we can find to use that we do not have to buy. Our tongs may look like tweezers

and stitch removers (courtesy of the local hospital), but they are tongs to us; and our album pages may have something printed on the reverse side that is totally alien to stamp collecting, and our three ring binders that serve as stamp albums have all sorts of advertising under the colored pictures pasted on their covers, but they are loved and revered as albums with a passion that makes me ashamed of not appreciating my Scott's International as much. Hinges we have to buy, but I stress that even though there are 1,000 in a package they are to be used carefully.

Now that we have a place to meet and have put out the word, a word about the first program. As the attendees arrive, they should register on a sheet with their name, address, telephone number and either their age or grade in school. I usually also at this time give them some sort of literature - either STAMP FUN or a stamp paper or stamp magazine. When I have three or four present, I start even if I have to go back over the material again, because children sitting get restless and sometimes will start arm wrestling or other distracting things. You can talk about any new stamps that are out to see if the children are aware of them being available at the post office., Tthe overall program for this meeting needs to be pretty general-and I usually start by asking: How many of you

- 1. know how to hinge a stamp?
- 2. know how to use a pair of stamp tongs?
 - 3. know what perforations are?
- 4. know what a commemorative stamp is? a definitive stamp?
- 5. have bought stamps at the Post Office?

And if you want them to talk, ask

- 6. What kind of stamps do you like best?
- 7. Do you have a stamp album what kind?

Sometimes at the first meeting we will have a Benjamin Franklin Stamp Club Program in the school. In our state, we have representatives covering certain areas, and we can get movies from them. They are employees within the Post Office Department who have other duties but they work with anyone who is interested in furthering stamp collecting. I have also found terrific support from our Postmaster and Assistant Postmaster in addition to the

school and library personnel.

I have not covered everything, but this should give some idea of the steps to take. I have found that each new group is a little different, but the main thing is to have lots of things to do - too many if possible, because they can always be done at the next meeting, and it is terrible to run out of anything to do or say with a group of eager faces looking at you!!!

DDR PHILATELIC ITEMS HOT

I have recently moved back to Germany for a second 3-year tour. Approximately seven weeks after I arrived in Germany, I attended the International Stamp Bourse in Sindelfingen, a suburb of Stuttgart. The show was busy. What surprised me was the number of kids there. There were at least three organized activities for them. Most of them appeared to be interested in stamp collecting, not just dragged there by their parents. In some cases, three generations were in attendance.

The theme of the show was the 500th anniversay of the establishment of a postal system in what is now Germany. The Deutschepost had a nice exhibit. The lines were long at the special cancellation windows and at the philatelic windows. It was also national stamp day in Germany.

I dropped a lot of coin (Deutschmarks- DM) at the Stamp Corner, a kiloware dealer from the Netherlands. His prices were cheaper in DM rather than the prices he advertises in the US philatelic journals.

We chatted. He told me that the hottest item was DDR kiloware. He sold ten 5-kilo bags and all his 1- and 2-kilo packages of DDR. Other dealers were showing sold out signs on their DDR mixtures. Several Germans I met, were there to buy DDR. They expect prices to go up and were getting DDR before the rise. ••• James Bailey (# 19)

SUGGESTS COVER CLUB AS FUN FOR ISWSC MEMBERS

Worldwide stamp collectors should consider membership in the Cover Collector's Circuit Club (not related to ISWSC or ISWSC newsletter *The Curcuit.*) The purpose of the club is to promote stamp and cover exchanges among the 20,000 members around the world.

American and Canadian members become Originating Members (OMs) on joining. Six to ten times a year OM's receive membership lists with 100 or more namesand addresses from around the world of collectors interested in exchanges/ correspondence. From these new and prior lists, OMs prepare cicuits of 4 names each, which pass from member to member until it returns back to the OM. It is the duty of each member to prepare a nice cover with at least three good stamps on it, in which the cicuit passes to the next person. Many members use full sets, obtain special cancels or hand drawn cachets to make their covers stand out. Once initial contacts ate made, collectors of similar interests can make their own arrangements for exchanging philatelic material.

Lifetime membership of OMs is \$5.003 US: OMs must be over 21 years of age. Foreign members (CMs) must be over 18 years old and currently reside in our 50 countries. Lifetime CM membership is \$4.00 US, which allows their names to be placed on the next membership list. They are not allowed to create circuits, but but pass them along as they receive them. After 1-2 years, they may apply for honorary OM status.

This is a great way to make international contacts for exchanges and friendships. For complete rules, an aspplication, and further information, send a SASE to the Membership Director Renate. Thompsonb, 241 Beaches Brook Lane, Cary, NC 27511. Don't forget to mention that you are an ISWSC member!

#4 - September 1991


#5 - November 1991




WOULD YOU LIKE TO HAVE YOUR VERY OWN POSTMARK?

Did you know that anyone in the U.S. can obtain their own personal postmark to cancel mail? First, ask a post office for Form #3620. At the top of the form write "Mailer's Precancel Postmark." After filling out the form, sketch a sample of your proposed postmark. It must conform exactly to the sample below, substituting your city name and zip, amd making your permit number 0 (zero). Your local postmaster will submit your application form and sketch to your main post office, where you will be assigned a permit number. The form is then mailed back to you, endorsed with your personal permit number. There is no charge whatsoever for any of this. Questioning postal officials should refer to the Domestic Mail Manual, section 143.3.

The only cost to you will be in the making of the rubber stamp canceller itself. Most print shops can make such rubber stamps. Make sure that the maker understands that the dates must be interchangeable! While the cancel design has to conform to the

sample, it can be made larger or smaller overall to your liking. If you have difficulty in finding someone locally to make a canceller, write to Herb Harrington, PO Box 585, Vienna, OH 44473-0585 and enclose a SASE for his current price. At last report, it was about \$15. He is the official cancel maker for the Mailer's Postmark Permit Club, PO Box 5793, Akron, OH 44372-5793.

Of course, the main reason to have your own postmark is to neatly cancel your own mail the way you wish. First, only black ink is to be used. Second, mail you cancel must be postmarked for the day it is mailed and given either to your mailman or a postal clerk. It can NOT be dropped into a mailbox. This is to prevent them from going through the regular cancellation machines and double postmarking your letters. By the way, one of your first letters (or postcards) should be to the Permit Club listed above. They will register your cancel in their records. Hundreds of collectors avidly seek out these personal cancels. ••• Tom Fortunato (# 379)

¿Whatzit? Answers:

12-1: Armenia # 285

12-2: Several members thought it might be an Egyptian revenue stamp; however, Ray Compton (#73) says it is an Egyptian postal tax stamp, issued by the Nasser government in the 1950s and is not listed in Scott.

12-3: Everyone agrees that this is a label that was issued se-tenant with a Polish commerative stamp, but the stamp is missing. Several members noted it likely has something to do with Copernicus.

12-4: Crete # J1 (Postage Due)

12-5: Netherlands Indies #N31, issued under Japanese Occupation. Member Al Feinberg (#361) added the following notation: Sakura 5 Japanese Naval Central Area - year 1943.

12-6: Mike Strawn (# 353) says it is Venezuela # 128 if it is gray; He also has this in orange. Stamps inscribed "Instruccion" like this one or "Escuelas" were revenue stamps which were also available for postage, often only domestically, between 1871 and 1895. Ray Compton agrees that this is a revenue stamp, being created by "resellada" overprint applied locally in 1900 to Scott # 128-135, which were originally issued in 1893. The overprinted issues are not

listed by Scott because they were not intended for postal use although many were used that way anyway due to shortages of postage stamps, especially in remote areas. Ken Jenkins advises reading note after # 135 in Scott's catalog.

My duplicates are stored in glassines in one those old oak library index card cabinets, about 5 feet tall by 2 feet wide, with many drawers. I laid tablet-back cardboard over the center adjustment slots and these drawers (about 2 feet long) hold hundreds of glassines. There are more modern types made of metal; I have one of those, also. I also can store postcards and many sizes of covers in these drawers. The older cabinets are scarce and will set you back several hundred dollars, but the newer metal ones used are usually reasonable (I got mine at a used office furniture store for \$125 a couple years ago.) ••• Rita Kallal (# 26)

Due to severe arthritis in my hands and fingers, I find opening the envelopes as suggested by other members, very painful and time consuming. I have three ring binders and put the 12-pocket manilla stock sheets with the countries listed alphabetically in the binders.

The only country that is in numerical order is that of Canada as I exchange on want list basis with several people. This method - manilla stock sheets - works very well for me.

OMNI EXCHANGE REPORTS ON 1990

In the six years that the OMNI EXCHANGE has been operating, members of the ISWSC have added stamps worth \$74,992 to their collections — with the only expense being postage, and a nominal charge for blank books!

The annual audit report for the 1990 year just closed, prepared by Exchange Manager Tom Allison #42, shows that more than 100 partipants added a total of \$15,487 in catalog value during the year — a new record!

The Exchange has grown dramatically since it was started in 1984 by Hal Clarke (#47), with a handful of members. There are now three sections in the Pink Book exchange (stamps cataloging 10¢ each and up), plus a Blue Book section (stamps cataloging 50¢ and up).

Dave Paul (#59), Dr. Issac Tannenbaum (#163_, and Jerry Gross (#429) each manage a Pink Book section with 15 to 25 exchangers, and Tom Allison (#42) handles the Blue Book section with about 35 members.

According to the audit report as of Oct. 31, 1990, there are a total of 859 books of stamps circulating with a combined total of \$46,945 in catalog value. In the Pink exchange, the average member added \$120 worth of stamps to his or her collection, had 9.8 books in circulation, and had an account balance of \$368 in catalog value. The average value of new books entered was \$59.

For the Blue exchange, the average member added \$203 worth of stamps, had 9.7 books circulating, and had a balance of \$392. Average value of the books was \$97.

The only expense for exchangers is the postage for sending books back and forth (usually 25¢ to 85¢ each time), and the cost of blank books which are supplied at 3 books for \$1.00. The exchange has a fee of 10% of the catalog value only on stamps actually retained by other exchangers. This fee is deducted from the member's account at the time the book is returned to the owner, after completing its circulation to members.


The OMNI EXCHANGE is the official stamp exchange of the International Society of Worldwide Stamp Collectors, and all active members of the ISWSC are eligible, and are urged to join. To become a member, just drop a note to OMNI manager Tom Allison, Box 252, Wilmette, IL 60091, and ask for an application and list of regulations. New exchangers are advised to start out with at least 3 books and may enter either the Pink (10¢) or Blue (50¢), or both sections.

Why not send for an application today, and see how easy it is to add stamps to your collection with a minimum outlay of cash?
